God bless all here.


AH A Message from your Minister

As a teenager in Belfast I was passionate about my faith and truly wanting to love God and follow Jesus. I often recall the way I would, during the troubles, waken up and listen to the news to hear who had been shot through the night. To my



shame my inner response would either be one of sadness if it had been a Protestant who had been killed, or relief if someone from the 'other side'.

This has come to me all the more powerfully recently, as I have been reflecting on the story of the Good Samaritan in my devotions. Let's face it, we all belong to a 'tribe'. Some of us call ourselves British, others major on English or Irish, and still others class ourselves as European. Or it may be that we draw the lines closer to home. We are from *Leigh on Sea* rather than Southend; we are not just Christians, we are *Methodist* Christians; and we belong to *Highlands* (for example) rather than to some other part of the Methodist Church. The thing is, once we embrace a 'tribe' we are more easily moved with pity when one of ours is injured, or to celebration when our team wins.



The story of the Good Samaritan deeply challenges this whole way of thinking. In Luke 9, verses 51 onwards we read that Jesus had been refused hospitality from the Samaritans because he was heading to Jerusalem and yet in the next chapter when asked "who is my neighbour" he tells

this amazing story, with a Samaritan as the good guy.

All the characters in it had a tribal identity, but Jesus shows us so clearly that that the values of the Kingdom of Heaven are blind to class, culture and creed. Basically it is all about our hearts. Are we open enough to be moved with compassion and be the neighbour? Or shall we pass by on the other side?

The more we spend time in the presence of God the more we become blind to our tribal prejudices and find we are touched by those around us, moved by news stories irrespective of who features in them. Of course the real challenge is always those on our doorstep, the people who use our building and cross our path! At Highlands we are good at that, but never let us forget it is not just what we do but where our heart is at as we embrace our neighbours, especially those in need.

Jobs for the garden

The season of mellow fruitfulness – I love the autumn. It's that time of year to keep dead-heading and feeding so that you can continue to gather, to clear away the summer bedding and start preparing for next year.

I've got both summer and autumn fruiting raspberries. I've already cut back the fruited canes of my summer raspberries to ground level and tied in the strongest young canes that have grown during the year. They'll be ready for next year. I'm still enjoying the autumn fruiting raspberries and won't cut these back until February next year. I'm lightly feeding my tomatoes, raspberries and hanging baskets with a high potash feed every couple of weeks.

My strawberries have thrown out many runners and I'm pegging the best of these into pots. Once they've rooted, I'll sever them from the old and plant them out.

It will soon be time to start planting out winter flowering pansies into hanging baskets and tubs so that they'll brighten the garden during the dull winter days.

Good housekeeping is important in so many ways – I'm clearing away the finished summer bedding, cutting back the perennials. My green bin and compost bins are overflowing! I'm collecting seeds from my favourite plants as I see them and

I'm collecting seeds from my favourite plants as I see them and I'm thinking – still just thinking – about cleaning out the greenhouse. It needs to be ready to start bringing in the tender plants before any cold weather comes but it's a bit of a daunting task.

And finally, don't forget to feed the birds. I feed the birds in my garden all year round as I get such pleasure in watching them swinging from the feeders and fluttering in the birdbath. You have to adjust the quantity of food to demand and never allow uneaten food to accumulate round the feeders as this can do more harm than good.

Dine with the Homeless


This is a dish we know as Island Rice, though it may have other names. And there are lots of variations with the same name. This serves about four people.

We love this because it's wholesome and tasty, easy to prepare and uses one cooking pot for everything including 2 (at least) of your 5 a day.

- 1½ lamb (neck fillet or boned shoulder), trimmed and cubed
- 2 tbsp oil
- 2 onions, fine chopped
- 1 level tsp turmeric
- 1½ pints brown stock

- 10 oz long grain rice
- 2 medium peppers (red and green) sliced and deseeded
- 4 fl oz (¹/₅ pint) dry white wine
- 4 oz peas
- 1. Brown the lamb on all sides in the oil
- 2. Add onions and soften for 10 mins
- 3. Add turmeric and cook for 1 min
- 4. Add ½ pint of stock, cover and simmer for 30-35 mins
- 5. Stir in the rice, peppers, wine and remaining stock and cook for a further 15 minutes
- 6. Stir in peas and cook for a further 5 minutes
- 7. Check seasoning and serve

*note for keen Methodists: about 25% of the alcohol in 12.5% ABV wine will evaporate during 20 min of cooking, and the amount left in an individual portion will be minimal - about 3.5 ml ($^{1}/_{8}$ of a fl oz , 0.007 pints, $^{1}/_{3}$ of a 'unit').

What I'm reading

Time for the editor to chip in as no-one else seems to have been reading anything in August. One of my many guilty pleasures is Robert Goddard. There are three things that mark his books out for me

Firstly they are thrillers, but not the kind of book that has lots of high technology, or an evil axe-murderer on every other page, or the President of the USA being gunned down*. The events tend to be rather less dramatic, but the narration is nevertheless full of psychological insights.

Secondly the main protagonist is usually someone who reminds me of myself. Basically he tries to do the right thing, but his character has flaws in the same way a colander has holes. So his life inevitably goes pear-shaped.

Lastly his stories are typically strong on location, mainly in the UK. For example if two of his characters meet on Hergest Ridge near Kington, Herefordshire, then you will be able to see for yourself that it's a real place. There are limits to this. People might not like their house to be identifiable as a crime scene – albeit a fictional one. So precise locations are sometimes invented.

Robert Goddard has written about 25 books from 1986 to 2018. I'm reading *Borrowed Time* from 1995. You should have no trouble finding his work in the library, bookshop, Amazon or even the local charity shops for older works. Also see https://www.penguin.co.uk/authors/robert-goddard/1025995/
