The stage in the Hall is in need of a tidy-up. If any of the items there are yours, please remove them by the end of July. After this date any items remaining will be disposed of. Thank you.


A Poem for July

Invictus

By William Ernest Henley (1849-1903)

Many of us have heard of the Invictus Games, an international multi-sport event, envisioned by Prince Harry for wounded, injured or sick armed services personnel. The name comes from this short poem, and you'll quickly see the relevance.

The work is famous not only for this connection but also for the much-quoted last two lines. As Christians we recognise their



meaning – we have free will – but we acknowledge that God alone sets the correct course.

Invictus means 'unconquered' and Henley himself suffered much with his health, writing this poem during a bout of TB. It has been a source of inspiration and courage for many in times of adversity, famously including Nelson Mandela.

Invictus

Out of the night that covers me,
Black as the pit from pole to pole,
I thank whatever gods may be
For my unconquerable soul.

In the fell clutch of circumstance
I have not winced nor cried aloud.
Under the bludgeonings of chance
My head is bloody, but unbowed.

Beyond this place of wrath and tears
Looms but the Horror of the shade,
And yet the menace of the years
Finds and shall find me unafraid.

It matters not how strait the gate,
How charged with punishments the scroll,
I am the master of my fate,
I am the captain of my soul.

Jobs for the garden

From our Special Gardening Correspondent

It's not been a good month, has it? It may turn out to have been the wettest June on record and it's been cold.

But now is the time to enjoy your garden – don't spend all you time working away – do take time to sit back, relax and take pleasure from God's gift of a garden. Either yours or a garden in a park.



Now is the time to start harvesting new potatoes – don't go in too hard with a fork or you may damage them. And summer raspberries should be ready too – my favourites.

Watering and feeding are top jobs this time of year – those tomatoes, especially ones in pots in a greenhouse need feeding 2 or 3 times a week. Hanging baskets need feeding too. If you have a container that has dried out almost completely, drip feed water into the compost of the middle of the container. That way, the water won't run-off straight away.

Tie in your runner beans. And it's time to prune those hardy geraniums to stop them flopping over and encourage second growth as well as rambling roses. Lupin flower stems should be cut back to base.



This time of year, grass cutting seems to be the most urgent job – warm sun and rainy days makes it grow really fast. But don't cut it too short as lawn grass quickly dries out and will go brown – assuming of course that we do get some hot sunny days in the near future. ©





Cake Me Out

Elderflower and lemon cake

I've made this cake several times now and I'm sure I've tested it out at church!

I made a larger version for the second tier of my son's wedding cake and it was by far the most popular of the 4 flavours. (The others were chocolate, gin & lime and plain vanilla)

Ingredients (Cake)

6 medium eggs 450g butter 450g golden caster sugar 450g SR flour 100g natural yogurt 50ml milk 2 lemons – zest and juice

3 tsb elderflower cordial

(Buttercream)

250g butter 700g icing sugar 300g full fat cream cheese 1 lemon (zested)

Method

- Heat oven to 140°C (fan)/160°C/Gas 3.
- Oil and line 3 x 20cm tins.
- Beat sugar and butter together until light and fluffy.
- Whisk eggs, yogurt and milk
- Add eggs/yogurt/milk mixture to sugar and butter, then add flour and zest of 2 lemons. Mix until smooth.
- Divide between 3 tins and bake for 40 mins. Check if done and if necessary, cook a little longer.
- Once cakes are cooked, prod the surface with a skewer. Mix the juice from 2 lemons with the elderflower and drizzle the syrup over the cakes. Leave to cool in tins.
- To make buttercream icing, beat butter, then add sugar slowly. Then add cream cheese and lemon zest. Beat until smooth, light and fluffy.

 Stack the 3 cakes with plenty of buttercream icing between them and then spread the rest on the top and sides of the cake.

Serves at least 18 slices. It's very rich so you only need a small slice anyway! (*Speak for yourself – Ed*)
