



From Your Minister

Dear Church Family,

A little poem to start us off....

June (by Ms Mal's Munchkins)

June is the month
Where we say goodbye to Spring
We wave hello to Summer
And fly a kite high on a string!
The weather's getting hotter
As the school year starts to end
I'm really so excited
To spend summer with my friends.



I loved this poem's child-like simplicity, reminding me of our call to be children. When we are in school it seems that the seasons are more pronounced, as they are marked by their named holidays and



terms. If we work in other jobs the seasons can often blur, especially with our British weather that regularly has us fooled.



One of the beauties of our church calendar is that we too, mark the seasons and important events and anniversaries. It gives us rhythm and a sense of moving forward.

I chose this poem as it invites us to move excitedly into summer, be playful with a kite or our other pastimes and, most importantly, spend time with friends.

I was wondering whether Jesus got excited. We do not use the word for Jesus's behaviour, yet he was fully



human as well as fully divine, so he must have got excited. I imagine he couldn't wait to return to his friends after his crucifixion – wow! I would have been beside myself with that surprise, wouldn't you?

Here is a verse I found that expresses Jesus' joy and excitement.

At that very time He rejoiced greatly in the Holy Spirit...."
Luke 10:21



Rejoiced greatly? The Greek word is *agallaiao*. The first syllable (*aga*) means 'much'. The second syllable (*llaiao*) means jump. The word literally translates as 'much jump!' Today we say 'jump for joy!' Was Jesus jumping for joy? I hope so.

This poem also talks of spending time with friends and of course we know Jesus spent

many hours with his close friends and family. He walked with them, talked with them and ate with them.

As many of you know, I am being ordained with my probationer

friends in Telford/Shrewsbury on the 29 June. I am so excited not just for my part but to share the experience with my friends. Pope Francis on Hospitals

He wrote these lines a few days before his death:

- † The walls of hospitals have heard more honest prayers than churches.
- They have witnessed far more sincere kisses than those in airports
- * It is in hospitals that you see a homophobe being saved by a gay doctor, a privileged doctor saving the life of a beggar in intensive care. You see a Jew taking care of a racist, a police officer and a prisoner in the same room receiving the same care, a wealthy patient waiting for a liver transplant, ready to receive the organ from a poor donor.
- † It is in these moments, when the hospital touches the wounds of people, that different worlds intersect according to a divine design.
- * In this communion of destinies, we realise that alone we are nothing. The absolute truth of people most of the time only reveals itself in moments of pain or in the real threat of an irreversible loss.
- * A hospital is a place where human beings remove their masks and show themselves as they truly are, in their purest essence.
- † This life will pass quickly so do not waste it fighting with people. Do not criticise your body too much. Do not complain excessively. Do not lose sleep over bills. Make sure to hug your loved ones. Do not worry too much about keeping the house spotless.
- * Material goods must be earned by each person. Do not dedicate yourself to accumulating and inheritance.

- * You are waiting far too much. Christmas; Friday next year when you have money; when love arrives; when everything is perfect... listen, perfection does not exist! A human being cannot attain it because we are simply not made to be fulfilled here.
- + Here we are given an opportunity to learn, so make the most of this trial of life, and do it now. Respect yourself, respect others, walk your own path, and let go of the path others have chosen for you. Respect. Do not comment, do not judge, do not interfere. Love more, forgive more, embrace more, live more intensely, and leave the rest in the hands of the Creator.

From the Editor

I often hear the phrase 'Britain is Broken'. I dislike it for two main reasons.

Firstly the word 'broken' seems to be a cliché here. It is imprecise and tendentious, being commonly used to make political points. I would prefer it if people looked for faults that can be put right (and then got on with it).

Secondly it is not true to say that the whole of this country is broken. I offer some examples of non-brokenness:

- 1. our 15 beautiful National Parks, especially at this time of year
- 2. the freedom I have to speak and worship as I wish
- 3. the fact that this is the sixth wealthiest country on the planet
- 4. the National Health Service

Even before I finish writing this list, I sense that some will regretfully light on the NHS as an example of something that is manifestly broken.

That view is open to challenge The average life span in 1950 when the NHS had just come into being into being was around 69 years. Now the average UK lifespan is about 81 years. Infant mortality (from 0 to 5 years old) was 44.27 deaths for very 1,000 children born in 1950. Today the equivalent rate is about 3.9 per thousand.

Undoubtedly, long waiting lists for surgery, and delayed ambulances, and inaccessable GPs (etc) are a fact. But the root causes lay in our longer lifespans, the vast range of costly treatments and medication

available, and our sharply inreased expectations. Medicine is still a wonderful thing, and the NHS still an effective way of delivering its benefits fairly to those who need them.

I have therefore included in this issue writings from Michael Rosen (on the NHS) and His Late Holiness Pope Francis (on people who give care). I hope you like them, but if you don't, you're very welcome to write to me about it. It is after all a free country.

Poem of the Month



Born 1946 in Harrow to an Ashkenazi Jewish family, Michael Rosen is an English children's author, poet, presenter, political columnist, broadcaster, activist, and a professor of children's literature at the University of London. Among his proudest achievements is that of becoming a much-followed internet meme consisting of him turning to the camera and saying 'nice'.

In 2020, he almost died with suspected COVID-19 while spending 7 weeks in intensive care at Whittington Hospital.

This poem follows that experience with a paean to the NHS, as well as a topical reference to a recent political comment.

My Island of Strangers Michael Rosen (1946 -)

I lay in bed hardly able to breathe but there were people to sedate me pump air into me calm me down when I thrashed around hold my hand and reassure me play me songs my family sent in turn me over to help my lungs shave me, wash me, feed me, check my medication perform the tracheostomy; people on this 'island of strangers' from China, Jamaica, Brazil, Ireland, India, USA, Nigeria and Greece.

I sat on the edge of my bed and four people came with a frame and supported me or took me to a gym where they taught me how to walk between parallel bars or kick a balloon, sat me in a wheelchair taught me how to use the exercise bike how to walk with a stick how to walk without a stick people on this 'island of strangers' from China, Jamaica, Brazil, Ireland, India, USA, Nigeria and Greece.

If ever you're in need as I was may you have an island of strangers like I had.

Dining In



Asparagus, courgette and goats cheese tart

This is a lovely summerly recipe that uses the wonderful English asparagus that's in the shops now. You could always substitute feta for the goat's cheese. It's from my favourite food author, Rukmini Iyer.

Serves 4

Ingredients

2 courgettes, thinly sliced 200g asparagus 1/2 tbs olive oil 1/2 tsp sea salt 1 lemon - zest only1 x 320g puff pastry sheet2 tbs crème fraiche100g goat's cheese, with rind, thinly sliced

Method

- Preheat oven to 180° deg fan/gas mark 6
- Mix courgettes and asparagus in a bowl with the oil, salt, lemon zest and some black pepper.
- Lay the puff pastry on a lined roasting tray and spread with the crème fraiche, leaving a 2.5 cm border around the edge.
- Arrange the courgette rounds on the crème fraiche and then the goat's cheese, finishing with the asparagus.
- Transfer to oven and cook for 30 mins.

Serve with a salad or roasted tomatoes.


