

From Your Minister

As Methodists we have an amazing gift of being a Connexional church (albeit with funny spelling!). We benefit from pooling our resources to have a bigger voice for God. One of these many benefits comes in the form of Advent and Christmas resources to support worship leaders and individuals. Each year the Methodist Church has a themed message, and this year's message is a beautiful one:



You are a gift. Made with love.



wonderfully busy time of year.

It made me think of all the gifts I buy for family and friends. I have actually put aside two full days in my diary to do my Christmas shopping this year. I am finally learning that it is not easy to "shoehorn in" shopping as a minister and jazz singer in this

When I was reading the resources for our Advent theme, I came across the advice below and I thought I would share it with you. I hope that it might inspire you to follow the rest of our Advent worship and reflection.

Here it is...

Think of preparing a gift.

Before you can give it, there's usually some work to do: removing packaging, peeling off the price label, maybe taking off a sale sticker.

As followers of Jesus we are called to be a gift to the world. Advent is a time to consider what in us needs removing. What attitudes, habits or distractions need peeling away? What doesn't belong in the gift?



Jesus says we must be ready for the coming of the Son of Man. As Advent begins, we reflect on what that means – not with fear, but with hope. We are being made ready, refined and wrapped in grace, to be given as gifts of peace to the world.

I wonder how many of you think of yourselves as a gift of peace to the world? And yet, with God's grace we have every opportunity to be just that. It reminds me of one of my favourite sentences in the bible: "How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace" [Isaiah Ch 52 vs 7]

I was thinking, what attitudes, habits or distractions would I like to work on peeling away to be the gift of peace.



I can often race into a situation or conversation without thought – I am generally too excited. So I thought I might begin with taking a breath and having an 'attitude of gratitude': being grateful for each person, each situation and each day before speaking or acting.

It is going to take practice, so I have started a journal which I have by my bed to write about what I have been grateful for. However ideally, I would like it to become more spontaneous in my day, each time I meet someone or arrive somewhere safely etc. I will think how grateful I am or say so!

I am sure you will all find your own thing, but as you do so, remember that

you are a gift

and

you are made with love

and God will be your protector and provider throughout this season of Advent, Christmas and into our new year.

I do hope that you will join us at Highlands for the many wonderful events and services. Please come and say hello to me; I will be so grateful! My prayer for all the members of Highlands, all who are friends of the church, and our local community is that you have a blessed time of joy, comfort, health and peace. I pray for you all as gifts of peace to our world in the name of our Saviour Jesus Christ.

You'll recognise these lines. Originally a poem of Keble (1792-1866), they were set to music, usually to 'Melcombe'. You can find it at Singing the Faith 137.

The message here is simple enough. We wake every morning to a new day – a day that is unique. No two days are the same. Even in prison we will have thoughts and dreams that are new.

We approach a new year, 2026, that is unique. Many of us will make 'resolutions' for the new year because we know that everything will change, and we may need to embrace that. Happily, another great hymn (StF 51 Great Is Thy Faithfulness) reminds us that not everything will change. Hymnist Thomas Chisholm (1866–1960) addresses God thus

Thou changest not, Thy compassions, they fail not As Thou hast been, Thou forever will be

So, we can confidently resolve to follow a God whom we know to be constant. Everything else will be exciting and different. Dining In

Aubergine & Fennel Gratin with Goat's Cheese & Walnuts

If like us you get an 'Oddbox' or a 'Veg Box' or a 'Zero Waste' box, you'll be familiar with the problem of seemingly random wonky vegetables roaming round the kitchen in search of a recipe. Chances

are you won't know what to do with them. You may even get suggestions from the family of what you can do with them.

In our case the deliquent veggies were aubergine & fennel, which sounds a bit like a dubious law firm. But I found a recipe that not only accomodated the uninvited veg, but also turned out an appetising dish.



Ingredients

(for 4 – easily halved)
600 ml crème fraîche
2 tsp sea salt
Ground black pepper
25g fresh flat leaf parsley, fine chopped

1 tsp grated nutmeg2 medium aubergines, thinsliced into rounds 500g fennel, thin-sliced 125g soft goat's cheese 50g white breadcrumbs 50g rough-chopped walnuts 1 tbsp olive oil

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C fan/200°C/Gas 6
- 2. Mix the crème fraîche, sea salt, pepper, parsley and nutmeg.
- 3. Lay half the aubergines on the bottm of a tin, then half the fennel, half the mixed crème fraîche and half the goat's cheese.
- 4. Repeat the above layers...
- 5. ...then scatter breadcrumbs and walnuts over the top
- 6. Drizzle with the olive oil then put the tin in the oven for 45 minutes. The top should be crisp golden brown and the gratin bubbling. Leave for 10 mins then serve with crusty bread.
