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From Your Minister



Once again at this time of year we turn our thoughts to the birth of Jesus; but all too often the wonder of this awesome event is obscured by the trappings of Christmas – holidays, presents, food, television, etc. But it is worth having a much closer look at the wonder of God coming to earth as a baby.

Think of any photos you may have around your house of babies; maybe your children, grandchildren or great grandchildren, or even babies your friends and families may have had?

When we consider the 'life' of a baby, what are the characteristics of babyhood? Total dependence for warmth, food and love; languageless; everything is 'new'; inability to move where you want to; nappies, teething etc. When we think about such things, we start to marvel that the eternal Son of God would submit Himself to the state of babyhood.

Christian author Philip Yancey once said;

The God who roared, who could order armies and empires about like pawns on a chessboard, this God emerged in Palestine as a baby who could not speak or eat solid food or control his bladder, and depended on a teenage couple for shelter food and love.

You, Jesus, were willing to lay aside everything – your glory, your position, your power – for our sake.

You were obedient to your Father in coming to earth.

And in coming to earth as a helpless baby, not only were you trusting yourself to a young, inexperienced couple, but also you were making yourself vulnerable to the attack of the devil through Herod. And yet, you trusted your Father to keep you safe.

The Bible says;

For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace. [Isaiah 9:6 KJV]

Given this wonderful description, readers of the Old Testament could be forgiven for expecting a glorious, triumphant entry into the world for the Messiah. But Jesus chose the way of obscurity, of humility and servanthood; yet those who seek Him, will find Him to be the glorious Messiah described in Isaiah chapter 9.

What a wonderful example to us today is the incarnation of God, setting forth the pattern that Jesus would grow up to present to us; a pattern for living, a pattern of gentleness, humility and love.

And what a challenge for us as Christians!

As this season unfolds for another year, may we not only give physical gifts to others, but also gifts of our own gentleness, humility and love, as we follow the example of the baby in the manger.

May you be richly blessed as you celebrate the birth of Christ.

From the Editor

When it comes to writing about what's in the news now, there is no shortage of subjects, and plenty of opportunity to contrast good with bad.



We have Christmas approaching (thumbs up ♠), but there's still a war going on in Ukraine (thumbs down ♠). As we wave goodbye to COVID (♠), an economic crisis comes into view (♠). A baby giraffe named Wilfred is born at Whipsnade Zoo (♠); climate change crisis (♠).

I have studiously avoided the subject of 22 men kicking a pig's bladder round a patch of grass in Qatar. The reason for this is simple − I can't really decide if it's a ⑤ or a ⑤. Most of the issues − human rights, migrant workers, corruption in FIFA, domination by global business interests − are matters of opinion.

There is one exception to this. Money. Money of course is fact. The total cost of building World Cup stadia and infrastructure (hotels, transport, security etc) is estimated in excess of £200 billion. The average price of a ticket for one seat at one game is over £250. The players are typically earning (or could earn) over ££50,000 per week.

At the same time the UNICEF appeal relating to the worst drought in 40 years in Somalia (about 1,500 km south-southeast of Qatar) informs us that:

£32 could provide vitamin sprinkles for 4 toddlers for a year



- £40 could provide life-saving food to cure a child from malnutrition
- £62 could provide life-saving oral rehydration salts to help at least 200 children

Let me do the sums for you. The 2022 FIFA World Cup could have been cancelled, saving as many as 2 billion lives. Fair enough, that's purely mathematical – there are probably not that many children starving in the world. But the point is clear. Our world does have the means. The question of course is whether we have the will.



There are some arguments against giving to worldwide disaster relief. Some might say:

Why can't people with more money than me give some of it to charity? I can't afford it as they can.

Essentially this is the 'World Cup' argument again. Jesus witnessed this event:

A poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a few pence. Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, 'Truly I tell you; this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their



wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything – all she had to live on.' [Mark 12: 42-44 NIVUK]

Will it make any difference? Jesus famously said: The poor you will always have with you [Mark 14: 7 NIVUK]

But Mark's Gospel continues: ...and you can help them any time you want. But you will not always have me.



Finally, there is the often-quoted 'charity begins at home' argument. This maintains that we should fastidiously help those in need within our own family or country before we think about giving help to anyone else. This is surely a misinterpretation. We certainly owe compassion and generosity in our relationships with those around us, but

we must also extend that compassion and generosity to the rest of the world.

God does not recognise manmade borders. We are all his children, wherever we come from, wherever we live and wherever we're going. When He sent his only Son to be born in a Bethlehem stable, the angels bore this famous message:

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men [Luke 2:14 KJV]



I think that 'men' in this message means 'all people'. A very Happy Christmas to all, and a peaceful 2023.

Dining In Christmas Biscuits

Here's a nice idea for a little present for someone. If young, it will keep them occupied for an hour or so (perhaps supervised), provide a treat, and may get them interested in cooking. The idea is to provide all the ingredients (except 1 egg, 150g of butter and 1 tsp vanilla extract) and simple instructions in a 1-litre jar.



<u>Ingredients</u>

- ❖ 125g wholemeal flour⁵
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 120g dried cranberries
- ❖ 150g rolled oats
- ❖ 1 heaped tsp cinnamon
- ❖ 145g soft brown sugar

- ❖ A pinch flaky sea salt
- 170g large white chocolate chunks
- 1 heaped tbsp malted milk powder (eg Horlicks)

<u>Method</u>: Layer the ingredients carefully in the jar. 1st the flour mixed with the baking powder. 2nd cranberries. 3rd rolled oats and cinnamon. 4th sugar mixed with salt. 5th chocolate chunks.

Now add this written instruction:

- 1. Butter 2 baking sheets and preheat oven to $180^{\circ}/160^{\circ}$ fan/Gas 6
- 2. Whisk together <u>1 egg</u>, 150g of butter and 1 tsp vanilla extract in a_bowl for 5 mins until smooth and creamy
- 3. Stir in the contents of the jar and mix to form dough
- 4. Put 12 golf-ball size blobs of the mixture onto each baking sheet and bake for 11 mins.
- 5. Leave on sheets to cool and eat while still warm

Jobs for the Garden From our Special Gardening Correspondent

I think we can say that the drought is over for now. The garden is now full of fallen leaves. If they are on the flower beds, you can leave them to provide natural insulation. If they are on paths, making them slippery, they should of course be swept to one side. Or, even better, they can be gathered and composted into leaf mould that will be an excellent mulch or compost after a few months.
