

From the Editor

Like Heather I cannot ignore the torrent of awful news from the Middle East. A well-known adage (wrongly attributed to Einstein)

holds that it is insanity to do the same thing over and over, then to be disappointed at getting the same result.

Famously, in 1337 England began a war with France that lasted 116 years (the so-called '100 Years War')¹. Each side in this war had 5 different kings. Apparently not one of these monarchs sat down with their advisers and said: 'It seems neither side can get the outcome they want. Maybe we should talk about it?'



The Israel-Palestine conflict has many of the same aspects. The same war, basically, has broken out in 1948, 1956, 1967, 1973 (followed by several peace treaties), the second intifada 2000-

2005, 2015 and now, 2023. The intervals have typically been marked by instability and sporadic violence.



The Bible is quite clear on how we should deal with aggression:

Do not repay anyone evil for evil. Be careful to do what is right in the eyes of everybody. If it is possible, as far as it

depends on you, live at peace with everyone. Do not take revenge, my friends, but leave room for God's wrath, for it is written: "It is mine to avenge; I will repay," says the Lord. [Romans 12:17-19]


The Qu'ran is equally clear. It notes [Surah 59:23] that *as-salaam* ('the peace') is one of the 99 names of Allah. The passage below chimes perfectly with St Paul's message to the Romans:

And if [your enemy] incline to peace, then incline to it [also] and rely upon Allah [Surah 8:61]

Echoing the Qu'ran, the Torah confirms that *shalom* (peace) is a name of God². Many of you will know this simple instruction from the Old Testament: *Turn from evil and do good; seek peace and pursue it.* [Psalm 34:14]

Finally, a correct attribution:

Peace cannot be kept by force. It can only be achieved by understanding [Albert Einstein].



<u>Dining In</u>

I enjoy watching *Masterchef* on TV. I am never less than awed by the skill and imagination of the contestants but I do notice that they have no apparent budget. Whatever expensive ingredient they want is



supplied. They typically have a limitless store cupboard and a huge choice of fresh vegetables, herbs and spices.

Out in the world of food banks, soup kitchens and B&B accommodation, things are different. We are however lucky in that local supermarkets and

fast-food outlets often give away unsold stock. Sometimes in great quantities. This gives the chef a challenge to use this bounty to make nutritious and flavoursome food safely.

At St Vincent de Paul we frequently receive chicken, often uncooked drumsticks and thighs. These sell less well than breasts (even though they have more flavour and less tendency to dry up). At other times we get cooked and coated chicken from the local branch of a well-known chain, and this needs to be uncoated before use. The cooking time of this month's dish is long enough to avoid any worries about safety.

Incidentally I was shocked this week by a local newspaper story 'celebrating' 10 years of a local food bank. Surely this should have focussed only on thanking the volunteers for their hard work. A local dignitary just about summed it up by saying: 'I hope to support [the food bank] for a very long time to come.' Really?

One Pot Chilli Chicken (Serves 8) Ingredients

2 large onions
2 tbsp olive oil
265g chorizo ring (peeled/sliced)
4 red peppers (deseeded/chunked)
2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes
2 x chicken stock cubes
½ tsp chilli flakes
2 tsp dried oregano
16 boneless, skinless chicken thighs
3 x 410g tins red kidney beans

To serve

15g coriander (chopped)2 avocados (sliced)good squeeze lime juice

- Preheat oven to 160°C fan, 180°C, gas 4. Fry the onions in the olive oil for 5 minutes until soft and beginning to colour. Add the chorizo and fry for 2-3 more minutes. Stir in the peppers, then pour in the tomatoes, followed by a tin of water. Stir in the stock cubes, oregano and chilli flakes.
- 2. Arrange the chicken pieces on top of the sauce then push them under. Bring to a simmer then cook in the oven for 40 mins. Stir the beans in, then cook for a further 20 mins. You can make this up to 2 days in advance and chill.
- 3. If reheating, ensure it's piping hot give it 70 minutes in the oven at 170°C fan, 190°C, gas 5. Stir in most of the coriander, toss the rest with the avocado, lime and a little salt, piled on top. Nice with garlic bread and a green salad with olives, cherry tomatoes and sliced red onion.

A poor life this if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare


Humour Corner

Puzzle of the Month Solution
