From the Editor

After a patchy summer, September 2021 has been a month of good weather. Figures are not yet available, but it seems that here in sunny South Essex we'll comfortably surpass the average daytime temperature.





Meanwhile, other countries are less comfortable with the warm weather. Wildfires have caused significant damage and loss of life in California, Greece, Turkey, Australia, Siberia and Brazil, along with many more locations. And it seems that human-generated climate change may be to blame.

Let me share two quotes from the same leading politician:

- 2015: 'fear that the present ambient warm weather is somehow caused by humanity...is ... without foundation.'
- 2021: *`it's time for us to grow up and realise who we are and what we're doing [to the planet]*

Even former sceptics, it seems, accept the prevailing evidence.

Meanwhile, back in the UK, you may care to visit the local supermarket. As you look along the shelves of fresh produce the shelves glisten and shimmer with reflections of the neon store lights. Shiny plastic cases almost every fruit and every vegetable, not to protect the buyer, but to contain the CO₂ that inhibits decay and delays the sell-by date. Millions of other products are either protected by or made of plastic. Where this plastic is discarded, only 9% is recycled; 91% is not². Across the world we

use and discard 480 billion plastic bottles, 1 trillion plastic bags, half a billion plastic straws³. Current estimates are that 30,000 tonnes of plastic waste enters the world's oceans every single day.



I could go on. But the point is clear. Unless we confront and reverse these destructive behaviours immediately, we will leave an appalling legacy to our children. As Christians we need to pray and act. Our prayer could usefully focus on the UN Climate Change Conference ('COP26') to be held in Glasgow, Scotland between 31 October and 12 November, under the presidency of the UK. Why not ask God to intervene and produce real progress?

In terms of personal action, I'm reminded of the words of a song by Jill Jackson-Miller Let there be peace on earth And let it begin with me...

Now, for the word 'peace', substitute 'action'. Fighting back cannot be left to others. It may be correct to say that say China or India are bigger polluters than the UK, but saying it achieves nothing. It may seem futile to try to avoid buying plastic, but 60 million of us doing and saying the same thing will make a difference. Green must not just be the flavour of the month – it has to be the flavour of the century.

To fail in this endeavour would be a catastrophe for us, a shocking emergency for our blameless descendants, and a grievous insult to God who left this beautiful planet in our care.

Serving the Homeless

Thank you all so much for your fantastic support for our Summer Hamper Raffle. Virtually all the tickets were sold, we raised an amazing £1,465 and some of the prize winners were from the Highlands Community. The full list of winners can be seen in the Jubilee Room. As a result, we have been able to send £2,500 to HARP for their new Bluebird Project and £500 for continued provision of fresh meat and vegetables for the next couple of months. The Bluebird Project, based in Southchurch Road Southend, is to provide a further 50 units of accommodation.

The HARP furniture store at London Road, Westcliff has now been closed and business transferred to the larger premises at Southend High Street. Other HARP shops are open at Southchurch Road, Leigh Broadway, and Hamlet Court Road. Full details at www.harpsouthend.org.uk/shops

Richard Hair, the Chair of Trustees for HARP for many years, is standing down at the end of the year as he enters retirement and moves away from the area. We thank him sincerely for the tremendous support that he has given to HARP.

We are also looking to work with YMCA and their new Homily Project, in Church Road Shoeburyness. This will be for 16-18 yearold adolescents who are unable to live at home.

Pastoral Report


I share with you Julie's pastoral report to the Church Council:

We don't know what the future holds but we do know who holds our future.

I have been thinking a lot about how to explain how I support Highlands and my job title really is the best way to explain. I am a Mission Enabler for older people and Memory Worship facilitator. I am sometimes not present at the outcome, but I have facilitated or enabled the action – made it happen.



The 1½ years of COVID have been tricky for all of us. I have struggled to carry on supporting and caring. But supporting the mental,



physical and spiritual wellbeing of older Highlands members and wider church family has been my priority; through networking with other local community connections to make a difference. Very often enabling or facilitating has meant sanitising the car, delivering the Highlander, putting on a face covering and offering a lift to a church.

Memory Worship online has also facilitated Worship for Leigh & Southend Methodist circuit family, care homes and others isolated at home. Holidaying at Home represented a statement to the wider community that Highlands were back as a community supporting church. So, it was really important to invite local and practical community connections to be involved. Eleven church members attended *Holidaying at Home*; Heather is an absolute pastoral star – thank you and God bless you Heather. Jean and Frank were there with their usual solid support with music and flowers. Ros helped get everything all back to its rightful place after the day. Janet picked up two of the ladies and made their day happen. Brenda our trolly dolly served tea, water and gravy but not all at the same time. 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<u>Dining In</u>

At the moment there seems to be a good deal of celeriac in the shops. It's not the prettiest vegetable, so you might ignore it, but it has lots of uses. You can roast or chip it like potatoes, and it makes a mash with a pleasant nutty flavour. Nutritionally it's packed with fibre and vitamins B6, C and K, but it's also low-carb.

If you find you have more celeriac than you can easily use, here's a spicy soup that uses it:

Ingredients

2 x cups of red lentils Medium beetroot peeled and cubed ¼ of a large celeriac peeled and cubed Veg stock cube

Water for stock 1 tsp paprika 1 tsp cumin 1 tsp coriander 1/2 tsp cinnamon Pinch nutmeg

Method

- 1. Fry the onion for 5 minutes until translucent
- 2. Add all the spices and stir for 2 minutes
- 3. Add beetroot and celeriac and allow spices to coat
- 4. Add 1 litre of stock and simmer 10 minutes
- 5. Add lentils and simmer until all vegetables are cooked through
- 6. Blend with a hand blender or food processor
- 7. Optionally, add some chopped dill and flat leaf parsley



9th Leigh Cubs/Scouts - Camp report

One problem that we've had over the last 18 months, is that many boys have joined cubs but have not been invested. Many have attended only 2 or 3 meeting before coming to camp. So we planned to invest 5 cubs at our closing ceremony but they needed to learn the law and promise beforehand. The scouts stepped up and helped our newest cubs to be ready to be invested. On Sunday, it was time to pack the tents away again and we were very grateful for all the mums and dad that came to Belchamps to help us. They struck and stowed the tents in no time at all leaving the cubs and scouts to tackle the traversing wall, which was not as easy as it looked. After lunch we held a closing ceremony and investiture before we all headed home - grubby, tired but having had a fabulous time. That was all of us, the leaders as well.

The children were smashing and kept us entertained with their funny comments and ways. There was plenty of free time for them to enjoy kicking a ball around or hanging out with friends. Not a mobile phone or laptop in sight. There was only one other group camping at Belchamps so we basically had the whole glorious site to ourselves and it was splendid in the autumn sunshine. Many thanks to all the volunteers who have worked hard to keep Belchamps going over the last 18 months.

A final plea – we are desperate to keep the group running but we need leaders. We are so grateful for our army of helpers but without new leaders, our future is in doubt. So please pray that someone will step forward. They are assured of the best possible support.
