
#### Humour Corner

#### **From the Editor**

I'm not sure whether any of you recognise this 1965 photograph. The man being carried away is Rev Angus Smith (1928-2019) who famously became a one-man roadblock to protest about a Sunday ferry service that was being introduced to the Isle of Skye.



I salute his dedication to his beliefs and I'm sure that Rev Smith was a pleasant, jovial and steadfast Christian man in private. However, he looks decidedly grim and unhappy in this shot. His church (the Free Church of Scotland) became associated in the minds of many observers with a brand of dour, humourless and strict Calvinist Christianity that was at odds with the times.

Many more of you will recognise the second photograph here. It is a member of Southend's 'Herd in the City', consisting of 46 decorated elephant sculptures and 72 baby elephants. The one seen here was on the pier.

Four of our grandchildren, visiting over the summer, insisted on tracking down as of the painted many pachyderms as possible. It was great to see their delight at the artwork and personality. Not only children took pleasure in the elephants – adults enjoyed them as well. There was of



course a serious point to exhibiting the elephants. Each one was sponsored and later auctioned, raising money for Havens Hospice. Southend was not the only location with a similar art trail. The island of Guernsey this year was populated with 60 giant puffins, which raised an astonishing £98,000 at auction for various charities. And of course, Southend had a previous occupation in 2021 by the 'Hares About Town'.

The elephants were wonderful examples of art made to delight and entertain. As Christians we can accept this as a gift and enjoy it openly, because our faith is a joyful faith. As Psalm 100 puts it:

Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. [UKNIV]

I will finish with a quick update on the Isle of Skye. In 1995 the Skye bridge opened. In 2004 tolls ended, making free travel to and from

the mainland possible seven days a week. This is a shame for the strict Calvinists, but long-standing declines in both the economy and population have been reversed. In Southend I look forward to the next migration - bears perhaps?

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## **Dining In**

This month's recipe is another from one of my favourite books, Rukmini Iyer's Quick Roasting Tin. Dinners in one tin, in 30 minutes - what's not to love?

Chicken, chilli and peanuts may sound like an unlikely blend, but it's my mum's favourite when she comes to dinner on a Sunday evening

#### **One Pot Peanut Chilli Chicken with Tomato Rice (Serves 4)** Ingredients

200g basmati rice 1 red chilli 300g cherry tomatoes 1 tbsp sesame oil 400ml boiling chicken stock 1 tbsp dark soy sauce 60g crunchy peanut butter 1 lime, juice only 8 free range boneless<sup>2</sup>, skinless chicken thighs

#### Dressing

2 tsp dark soy 1 tbsp lime juice 1 tbsp sesame oil

#### To serve

Handful of peanuts 3 spring onions Fresh coriander

Preheat oven to 210°C fan, 210°C, gas 8. Tip rice into lidded casserole (or deep roasting tin) with tomatoes and pour over boiling chicken stock.

Mix peanut butter, red chilli, sesame oil, soy sauce and lime juice together. Lay chicken thighs over the rice and tomatoes and pour peanut butter mixture over the thighs, smoothing it over. Cover with the lid or, if using a roasting tin, cover with foil, very tightly. This is important as the rice needs a good seal to cook properly. Transfer to oven and bake for 30 minutes.

Once the chicken is cooked and the peanut butter has formed a lovely golden crust, mix the dressing. Pour over the chicken and rice, scatter peanuts, spring onion and coriander and serve hot.


